THE STAMP OF FAITH

How do you choose Christmas cards or Christmas stamps? Some outlets don't have any religious designs at all; ones which relate to the baby Jesus, his Family, the Shepherds, the Wise Men. It's as if it was something to be embarrassed about. Or is it that people, even Christians, are afraid to demand a supply of them? The Post Office are producing two sets of Christmastide stamps. First and Second Class have their own traditional art impressions of the Madonna and Child. The second 'Christmas' set is a cartoon version of a Snowman or Santa Claus. Please insist on the religious ones; rumour once had it they were going to stop them. If we can't obtain them perhaps we should decline the cartoons and ask for normal ones. Make a point about what a *real Christmas stamp* should be; and it's not robins, snowflakes, Xmas trees, etc. People of no religious faith or other faiths can buy them. The right image can set the right tone and hopefully lead to a right understanding about the *real* Christmas if people perceive in us what is really important.

I'm thinking of this issue because I have seen a rather striking poster for a talk which will have been given in November. It will, I suspect, have been very interesting talk about 'The Annunciation' (Gabriel's Visit to Mary and its consequences). Our Church's East Window depicts a very beautiful version of that event! The poster in question shows a lovely striking image of our Lady: but it's not about the Annunciation. For those who can perceive it properly, the poster depicts Mary, the Immaculate Conception. This religious doctrine, with implications for Mary's future role as Jesus' Mother, relates to HER conception (celebrated on 8th December). It's not about the Virginal Conception of the Lord at the Annunciation (celebrated on 25th March – nine months before Christmas, naturally!!).

This leads me (not so subtly) into letting you know that on 8th December at 12noon, Norman, our Bishop Visitor, will be celebrating Mass of the Immaculate Conception for us and preaching its meaning. Please, do come and hear him, helping us perceive more clearly, on this day, the increasing focus on the forthcoming great festival of the Incarnation – the birth of the Christ Child.

Furthermore, perhaps the best way to perceive anyone's faith isn't by cards and stamps; nor by lectures, concerts, Christmas shows or a plethora of group 'Christmas' meals. The world at large, neighbours and family will 'read' the truth of our personal faith by the way we will commit ourselves to worship and celebration of the great mystery of faith, at the ACTUAL Christmas itself; not by the peripheral events which accompany the celebration. If the Post Office are to take the message seriously for stamps – so must Christians 'stamp' their faith by their worship!

News from the Tower

At the time of print, St John's Tower, Higham would have rung a quarter peal for the KCACR's project of trying to get as many towers ringing a QP during the month of November. I will update you on their achievements next month.

Meanwhile, whilst on a visit to The Lynn Minster last month, I gathered some information about their bells, which seemed of great interest to me so I thought I would share it with you.

The Bells of the Priory and Parish Church of St Margaret of Antioch.

The present Minster stands on the site of a church founded by Bishop Herbert de Losinga c 1101, as a Benedictine priory. In early times the monks would have used a bell to control their cycle of prayer through the day. Bells were also used to advise the townsfolk in time of great emergencies such as flooding and fire and, at one time, the fire engine was kept in the porch of the Minster. The number and size of bells a town had was a matter of prestige and there is no doubt that the importance and wealth of Lynn was well demonstrated. Mackerell writing in 1738 told us "the largest bell was called the Margaret and was the finest of her kind and could be heard (wind favouring) a full ten miles distant".

In 1616 a bell for St Nicholas' Chapel was recast in a pit dug on the Common Staithe in Lynn. The bell had been cast initially at a founders in Thetford but was unsatisfactory so was re-cast by James Edberry at Wiggenhall St Germans. This was still unsuccessful so a warrant was served on Edberry to do the job again in Lynn. This pit was rediscovered during the preparation work for the conversion of the Corn Exchange to a concert hall in 1995.

Bell metal is an alloy of 77% copper and 23% tin but in the past, all sorts of things were put in to make up the weight. The bell cast in 1616 on Common Staithe for St Nicholas' Included the pulpit candlestick as a makeweight. Bells re-cast in 1645 for St Margaret's included a brass eagle lectern and some more metal, which had been gathered by asking around the town.

We know that there were medieval bellfounders in Lynn, although making bells probably didn't provide a fulltime living. Evidence of other metals from excavated bell pits in Norwich suggests that the founders also cast every day pieces such as cauldrons and other domestic items. In later centuries there were still a number of small-scale local founders such as Thomas Osborn of Downham Market who recast St Margaret's 9th bell in 1800. Sadly, today there is only one bell founder left in the whole of England (Whitechapel foundry having closed earlier this year), this being John Taylor's at Loughborough. The present Minster bells are based on a ring of eight cast at Whitechapel in 1766, when six bells were also cast for St Nicholas' Chapel. Loughborough carried out major restoration work including a 9th bell in 2005. This now makes Loughbororough the only company anywhere in the world who can cast bells for the distinctively English practice of change ringing.

By the 16th century there seem to have been five bells in each of St Margaret's towers. The south-west tower contains two generations of belfries. Before the edition of the of the 14th century top stage, the 13th century middle storey had previously been a belfry. The tower now only houses the Sanctus bell. In the beams, supporting the floor of the 14th century bellchamber, you can see five holes through which the ropes of the medieval bells hung down. The holes are arranged in a line, unlike the circular arrangement familiar later for post medieval change ringing. These bells were sold by the town in 1550 to pay for munitions to defend it from potential attack.

The north-west tower, the present bell tower, originally resembled its southern neighbour. However, its surviving 12th century arch into the Church clearly showed how badly the tower began to lean due to the softness of the ground. An appeal for repair had raised £30.00 and in 1432 the church authorities approached the councilmen. The plan was to rebuild with two Arch buttants, possibly now forming the east and west walls of the north porch to strengthen the weakness that side. The constables were ordered to "go through the streets and ask every man how much they would be willing to give towards the building". The repair work started in 1436 and took two years. By 1452, the tower was rebuilt and lined with bricks faced with stone. Here the five bells of unknown age, known as "Margaret, Trinity, Nicholas, John and Thomas" were placed within the tower and were still in place at the time of the Reformation.

After the Reformation, the religious revolution in the 16th century led to the promotion of protestant ideas and all ringing was cancelled with the exception of the tolling of a single bell to announce the time of service and tolling on the day of a funeral. In 1552 the commissioners carried out their survey of Church goods where they made account of five bells remaining at St Margaret's Church, each weighing between 14 and 28 hundredweights. Being too heavy to remove, they remained in situ. On the death of Edward VI in 1553 and the accession of Mary to the throne, the bells were reprieved and once more bells were used to

sound out emergencies or invasions although during WW2 the bells were silenced for normal purposes and ONLY used in the event of an emergency. It was vital to maintain a corps of people who could sound the bells and it isclear that during Elizabeth's time bell ringing was considered a popular sporting activity. In 1566 a chiming mechanism was set up at St Margaret's, which played a different tune every day of the week on the five bells in the north-west tower.

The bells were kept in good order. The details of a new frame and rehanging in 1595 make it clear that full circle ringing was the practice by now. Ringing was, and is, an activity requiring care and awareness. In 1621 "a man was drawn up by the rope of St Margaret's great bell and killed thereby" In 1626 the wardens were obliged to pay eight pence to "two men that carried the man out of the steeple that was wounded there" and two shillings and sixpence "to a woman who took him in pending recovery".

In 1646 St Margaret's bells were recast. In the summer of 1647 all five bells were back in place and when the chimes were reconnected, two new tunes were added to the repertoire. During 1664, the five-recast bells were augmented to create a peal of eight bells and Lynn ringers led the district for bell ringing. The Lynn ringers by this time had become proficient and were successfully attempting long lengths of ringing. They must have been frustrated when in 1741, during a gale, the spire crashed down and fell across the body of the Church. The damage was extensive and the repairs took four years to complete. The Churches first peal was rung to commemorate the completion of the repairs where a total of 5,040 changes were made. The board in the ringing chamber records "1746 Jan 20th Rung the five thousand and forty changes of Gathron's Trebles in three hours and forty minutes".

Another set of new bells where installed in 1766 - 8 for St Margaret's and 6 for St Nicholas' Chapel. A notice in The Norwich Mercury announced that the new bells would be opened on Tuesday 24th June.

The ringer's expenses for opening the bells were £9/6/8d. The cost for the new bells was £383/17/0. Ringers saw their efforts as public entertainment and crowds gathered to hear them perform. In between the great peals came the more regular ringing activities marking the services and the highlights of the year and the ringers continued to mark national occasions. The death of George III was marked by tolling the great bell from 2 pmuntil 11 pm. On the day of his funeral, the tolling lasted from 7 am until 8 pm followed by a muffled peal until 10 pm. Two new bells were augmented for Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee. The return of whaling ships which traveled from Lynn to Greenland from 1770s until 1820s, was hailed by the sound of the Church bells. These voyages were long and dangerous and a returning whaler was a cause for local excitement. Although whaling from Lynn had ceased by 1830, the Minster was lit by whale oil lamps until the introduction of gas in 1835. On the walls of the ringing chamber are letters of appreciation from H M The Queen, Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother and also a telegram of thanks from Winston Churchill for the peal rung to celebrate the end of the 1939-45 war.

By 2000 the bells were in great need of attention. The bells were out of tune and had become difficult to ring. Norman Harding BEM was the tower captain here for nearly fifty years. He died on January 26th 2001

aged 91 and it was largely through his generous bequest (aided with a grant from The Heritage Lottery Fund) that the bells of the Minster were completely restored in 2005. Norman started ringing at the age of twelve and it became his lifelong interest. He travelled all over the UK ringing peals and in 1983 he was awarded the BEM for services to bell ringing. In total he rang 611 peals and helped ring in the new Millennium


at the age of ninety. After his funeral, the Minster and other local ringers rang the bells half muffled and on Sunday February 11th 2001, a peal of 5040 changes of plain bob royal was rung in his honour.

A single bell hangs in the south-west tower. This "Sanctus bell" is chimed at the consecration of the bread and wine during services of the Holy Communion. A medieval Sanctus bell may have hung in its own turret on an eastern gable of the building. However, this small bell was originally cast as a market bell. It hung in the market cross to regulate business proceedings. The market cross was taken down in 1831 and the bell's whereabouts thereafter was unknown until itwas hung in the small spire of St Edmunds Church in North Lynn, built in the 1950's. When the Church closed in the 1990s, the bell was placed in storage until 1999 when it was placed in the southwest tower of the Minster.

Do you know why there are so many robins on Christmas cards? The first postmen in Victorian times wore red and were called robins, so robins were shown as delivering cards.




Whatever kind of card you send this year, be sure to include a kind message with love for your friends. Our love is a tiny echo of God's love for all the world.

Here is a simple 3-D Christmas tree that you can use as a decoration or a card. You will need green card, crayons, glitter or paint, scissors and sticky tape.



Fold a piece of card in half, then cut it in half. Put the two pieces together and fold them in half again.

Draw half a Christmas tree opposite the fold. Cut along the line and you will have 2 identical trees. Fold the trees in half, very lightly, hardly creasing the centre line to mark the centre of the tree. Cut a slit along the bottom half of the centre of one tree and along the top half of the centre of the other tree. Slip the two trees together along the slits. To help the tree to stand firmly, use sticky tape to fasten the parts together where they meet.



Decorate the tree. If you are using it as a card then leave an area free of decorations so that you can write on it.

Welcome. The weather is turning colder and the desire to sit and stitch on a cold winter's evening is nearly upon us.



Back on the 21st of October we were privileged to have Pat Trott as our guest speaker, when we learnt about Crewel work (<u>www.pattrott.co.uk</u>). Pat started sewing at a very young age and continues to delight, with her teaching and inspiration.

Crewel Work is an ancient craft using a thin worsted yarn and goes back to at least the 17th century. Work that we all know has either been

done or inspired by Crewel work. The Bayeux tapestry, William Morris and in the 20's and 30's a revival of Jacobean work came about, some are still in use today in churches and museums.

On the 18th November we have our Christmas Stitching afternoon, where we have four groups of people each stitching a different project. Called the four corners for obvious reasons we try and get our projects completed in an afternoon, but it can be a tall order because of the chat and natter and mostly laughter that ensues, but, in the main, we get them done.
