

FR ROGER DAVISON, PRIEST 10TH MAY 1920 – 24TH APRIL 2017

This is an edited version of the funeral homily given by The Revd. Prebendary Graeme Rowlands – a similar version also appeared recently in the Walsingham Review

I was the last of the Curates trained (by Fr Roger) at Higham Ferrers, in the shared life of the Clergy House and as members of the Company of Mission Priests; because of that I owe so much to Fr Roger for his formation of me as a Priest. To be a priest is not to play out a role or do a job which begins and ends at particular times each day. It is what we are at every moment and we show that essence to others by being ourselves, I learned that very clearly from the moment I arrived in Higham Ferrers. ^[1] They were very different days. We received £10 per month in spending money, £60 per year for holidays and £30 before Christmas with which to buy presents. The house was 'in silence' from 10.30pm to 9.30am. On 'the day off' we sang the Office at 7.00am, concelebrated Mass at 7.30am and then, if you had not decided otherwise, Fr Roger would suggest what you might then usefully do! This was not a distant and draconian regime: it was the rich and fertile ground in which men newly ordained could learn how to be a priest.

Fr Roger trained at Kelham ^[2] after the war, after he had received his discharge from the Army. There, with its daily cold showers, he had learned the benefits of communal life and of priestly discipline. He always taught by example. Every morning he was in Church and on his knees before anyone else arrived – you could feel the attention and care with which he prayed. The daily Office was the rhythm by which he lived and breathed and it remained an essential part of his routines until the day he died (his Office book was marked up to the evening he was taken to hospital). The reverence with which he celebrated the Mass and, latterly, received Holy Communion, was tangible. His service at the altar led on naturally to his care for God's House and a sacrificial love for his people.

Trained at Maples, in the furnishing department, before the war, Fr Roger knew what could be usefully made into an elegant pelmet and altar frontal;

he had a natural eye for colour and for graceful lines; and he loved tall and tapering candles. There are many churches, countrywide, which bear the stamp of his artistic flair; many of those furnishings were often supplied out of his own pocket.^[3]

He lived and breathed the life of his people. In his daily and regular contact with his Parish he found many a truth, which could not be told or discussed elsewhere, could be learned over a mug of tea in the kitchen. He had an eye for those details in peoples' lives that mattered to them and an almost photographic memory; he knew when to sympathise or encourage, to challenge or rebuke. He remembered their aches and pains, knew their joys and sorrows. He also had very powerful guardian angels, in fact, we all did, for his driving was somewhat erratic and his culinary skills were legendary: he was actually a very good cook but sometimes the left-overs which he used up were not in the first flush of youth.^[4] And it was fun: we laughed about the eccentricities of human nature, about our own faults and foibles, about the vagaries of Church and clergy.

Fr Roger's connections with Walsingham go back into Fr Hope Patten's time^[5] and he remembered 'The College' (of clergy) functioning as such in the Shrine. He was made a Guardian in the 1960's when Fr Colin Stephenson was the Administrator.^[6] Fr Roger has served the Shrine faithfully ever since. How good it is, then, that it is in Walsingham he finds his final resting place.^[7] May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

NOTE on FUNERALS: Services in S.John's may be celebrated for any Christian who resided in Higham; not just for regular members of the congregation. They're usually followed by cremation, sometimes by burial at S.Mary's Churchyard. Again Christian burial there is possible for any resident not just Church members. This applied to ashes in both Churchyards too. Neither do you have to have been a regular attender of any Church of England congregation for the parish's Vicar/Rector to take your funeral service. However if you definitely want your parish priest to lead the service it is advisable to inform the Undertakers straight away before they make arrangements with crematoria. It is becoming frequently common for clergy to be asked to lead a service by special family request only to find this out after everything else has been fixed. When we cannot then oblige it leads to disappointment for clergy as well as families.

HiARA JULY REPORT

An extremely funny talk by Brian D'Arcy entertained HiARA members with his light-hearted lecture on "The Crown Jewels".

Mr D'Arcy started his working life as a Yeoman Warden at the Tower of London, eleven years later was promoted to "Custodian of the Crown Jewels". He holds The Royal Victorian Medal, which is a gift of Her Majesty, the Queen.

We were taken on a journey through the life of the jewels; from before Oliver Cromwell melted them down/sold them off, which resulted in no crown for Charles II at the restoration of the monarchy. S.Paulinus, with others who were accompanying Ss. Justus and Mellitus, was sent to 'England' by Pope S.Gregory the Great in 601; four years after S.Augustine landed in Kent. S.Justus was to be the first bishop of Rochester in 604, S.Mellitus the first of the newly re-established bishopric of London.

Originally monks from Rome, their roles in the life of the Church led both Ss. Augustine and Paulinus to be known by the places where they served. S.Augustine of Canterbury as he is called was its first bishop. The name distinguishes him from the great bishop and teacher S.Augustine of Hippo in North Africa. S.Paulinus is usually referred to as 'of York' as he was to become its first bishop.

For 24 years little is known of S.Paulinus' life and work in Kent. Evidently he built a reputation for in 625, when Princess Ethelberga of Kent married the pagan King Edwin of Northumbria, S.Paulinus travelled north with her. He was to play a major role in the conversion of Northumberland which, by 625, was the largest and most powerful of the Anglo-Saxon kingdoms. On Easter Day, 12th April 627, in a timber chapel erected at York, King Edwin was finally baptised, "together with all the nobility and a large number of humbler folk". Subsequently S.Paulinus became the first Bishop of York. He pursued his Northumbrian mission for six more years, during which the temporary wooden chapel began its evolution into York Minster. Such was his prestige by then that, around 630, he was called upon to consecrate a fellow Italian, S.Honorius, as the new Archbishop of Canterbury.

Sadly in October 633 King Edwin was slain in battle by the pagan forces of the kingdom of Mercia. Driven from his diocese S.Paulinus fled with Queen Ethelberga and her family back to Kent. Here Archbishop Honorius was able to honour his principal consecrator by appointing him as the third Bishop of the vacant see of Rochester. He headed the diocese until his death in 644.

It is because of that role, not the one in York (important as it was), that on October 10th, the feast of S. Paulinus, our mass is always offered for the ministry and role of our diocesan bishop. We will pray for Bishop James Langstaff who, as successor to S.Justus, S.Paulinus and other saintly bishops, is the 107th Bishop of Rochester.

May these great saints pray with us, for him, to the God of us all.



NEWS FROM THE TOWER

I am very pleased to say that the Higham ringers are now of the standard to be able to assist other towers in the surrounding area to ring at weddings, funerals and thanksgivings etc. We have been helping out quite regularly all summer. We continue to have 8 registered members of the KCACR, however, we will always welcome new members. If you are in the area and already ring or whether you would like to learn and are involved with our Church here at St John's or indeed would like to be involved, please contact me on 07956336134.

Because we are now entered into the KCACR handbook as bells regularly rung, I am pleased to say that we are now creating interest from other towers wishing to ring our bells (albeit that they have to be rung via the simulator). So far we have had two requests to ring from All Saints Maidstone and SS Peter and Paul, Headcorn.

The St John's Higham ringers had their very first own ringing tour in the Darenth Valley area. This took place on 29th July and comprised of 5 Higham ringers and 13 others, the farthest coming from Sparsholt, Winchester. Our first ring was at St Mary, Westerham and is an 8 bell ground floor ring. This Church has a rare mediaeval wooden 'ladies' staircase. General James Wolfe is commemorated in a stained glass window by Burne-Jones. Our next ring was at St Martin, Brasted. This is an 8 bell tower, hung anticlockwise in an Elizabethan frame. The tower was built in three stages beginning in

the 12th century and completed some 200 years later. The Stocket chapel was privately owned until 1912. Our third ring was at St Lawrence, Seal Chart. This is a lovely little Victorian Church with six bells, designed by Charles Howell and built in 1868. Twenty years later, a tower was added. The bells were restored in 2015. A very welcomed lunch came next at The Crown Point Inn. Seal Chart. We then moved on to St Peter, Ightham, where they have 6 bells. We had a lovely ring in the gallery enjoying views down into the church. The Church is recorded in the 12th century and a Saxon Church probably preceded it. The present Church was rebuilt in the 14th-15th centuries. Our last ring was at SS Peter and Paul, Seal. This is a 6 bell tower and the ringing used to take place just below the belfry. When the clock was installed, the ringing chamber was moved to the ground floor where the bell ropes are now a challenging 60 feet long!! A little statue of St Peter complete with keys is above the porch door. This was a very enjoyable tour. We all look forward to the next one. Hopefully, I will be looking to arrange the next one in the coming Summer/Autumn.

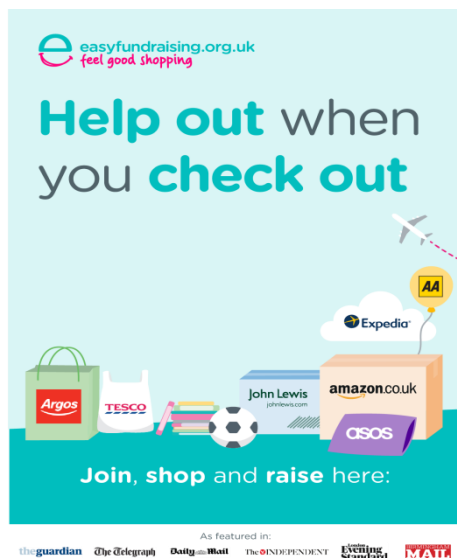
Oldest computer

LENT WITH THE NHS

When I was admitted to hospital with an infection in my leg on 10 June I didn't realise that I would be in three hospitals successively for six weeks. As time moved on I began to see the days (just over forty) as a sort of secular Lent. I was in the Medway Maritime, Charing Cross and St Mary's Paddington. As I write I'll combine them into one experience, mainly based on St Mary's.

I thought of St Matthew's account of Jesus' time in the desert (4:1-11) and couldn't help comparing this with my own experience and seeing some of the similarities in a more secular way

The hospital was like the desert – a vast place full of voices and noises, of people constantly on the move both day and night in which the individual was a very small person. It was a place of apprehensions and fears – the discomfort following treatment, confusion about what was happening and not understanding all the medical terminology, being away from home and the after-effect of an anaesthetic on ones 'regular bodily system'. Despite this it was possible, especially in the long night hours, to be entirely on one's own and to think and reflect on immediate concerns and on wider universal themes.

Every Christian uses Lent to try to face and overcome temptation. "...by thy Baptism, Fasting and Temptation, *Good Lord, deliver us*" (The Prayer Book Litany). My first temptation was to feel sorry for myself but as I thought about my predicament I knew that it was entirely my own fault and, looking at the other men in the ward, I could have been in a much worse position. The second temptation was to cut myself off from the wider world and live in the cocoon of the daily round of the hospital and its programme. Since I left Ealing I had been feeling in the wilderness as a priest without a parish. I was looking forward to starting at St Luke's Gillingham

(on 11 June!) and helping Fr James at Higham (my local parish) when he was away. I had to accept that this was not going to happen. I didn't tell anyone in the hospital that I was a priest but they all seemed to know in due course. The matron apologised for not calling me father. Another senior nurse asked me to bless her for her forthcoming marriage. As I lay in the ward it came home to me that wherever I was, at the high altar at St Mary's Bourne St, or seated in splendour in my stall at St Paul's or here in bed, the priest never ceases to be a priest even if he isn't where he would wish to be. When I stepped down as a full time parish priest I complained to a secular friend that I missed being the centre of attention. Another temptation in the hospital was to talk and think solely about myself (even more than normal!). My friend came to see me in the hospital and pointed out that at least I was the centre of attention again! I thought about this. Visitors, friends, family and parishioners, and other people in the ward, without realising it, helped me turn the attention away from myself.

Jesus fasted in the forty days. I had no intention to fast but the hospital fare made the time feel like a time of abstinence and fasting. I planned a daily diet as though I was in a monastic house (not like the French Benedictine houses where I've stayed in the past and eaten very well!). Visitors kindly brought me mountains of biscuits, fruit chocolates, drinks and nice things. I was most grateful but couldn't cope with them all. My brother took them away for later consumption or redistribution. I realised about the fifth week that I hadn't had any alcohol or wine, and I hadn't missed it. When I left the hospital I had lost over two stones. I had never been able to achieve that through the liturgical fasts or diets!

Another abstinence was not being able to go Sunday and daily mass. I was very grateful to the priests who brought the sacraments to me each week, especially to Fr John Hunter from St Stephen's

Gloucester Rd. Fr John is tall and gaunt. One day when he came into the ward my elderly neighbour in the next bed sat up in alarm thinking that his time had come! Thanks to the iPad I was able to recite the Divine Office each day. I wondered what the other inmates would have thought if they knew that they were in a place sanctified albeit silently by the daily prayer of the whole Church, ascending to heaven from their midst. Some of the language in the male ward was very profane but the silent prayer seemed to neutralise it and rise above it!

Everyone who has been in hospital for any length of time knows how long and sleepless the nights can be. I was extremely grateful to two Ealing friends who brought me a radio and headphones. This meant that I could listen to music in the dark hours. That the radio stations continue throughout the night is such a blessing. I also tried to pray in the night and use my long experience of attempting 'the prayer of silence'. However, the length of the night and the frustration at not being able to sleep in such a comfortable hospital bed, seemed overwhelming. I have learnt by experience that saying the rosary is a good way of falling asleep. After only one Our Father and six Hail Mary's you soon drop off. I tried this and it worked at first. However, not wishing to misuse the rosary, I also made sure that I knew by heart all the events of Our Lord's life included in the four sets of the Mysteries. I tried to say one of the Mysteries each night with a specific group of people as my intention. Then I found, rather to my secular chagrin, that I was staying awake to the very end of the set of particular mysteries! I began to realise what a wonderful tool for prayer the rosary is, combining verbal prayer, bodily prayer, counting the beads, and reflection on the cycle of human redemption revealed in the life of the Saviour. I felt that even after all these years as a priest I had learnt something new and enriching about the life of prayer. The monks of the Benedictine monastery of Le Barroux in France say in the introduction to their rule that they pray in the night because it is a

time when “thieves operate, plots are hatched and lust rages”. I didn’t exactly feel like that in these circumstances but I could see the opportunity of sanctifying the long night hours with prayer and trying to turn sleeplessness into watching for the Lord “I will bless the Lord who gives me counsel, who even at night directs my heart” (Ps 16).

When the devil had finished with Jesus “the angels ministered unto him”. For me the ministering angels were the hospital staff – consultants, doctors nurses healthcare workers ward personnel, so many involved in the daily care of a patient and all so dedicated and thorough. Equally ministering as angels were all the family, friends and parishioners who came to visit me, or phoned me from faraway places. I was very pleased to see them all and resolved to be a better friend in the future. I felt humbled to know so many wonderful friends. Their visits were so helpful in enduring such a long time in hospital.

I had stopped thinking about coming home but when I was given a release time I was counting the hours to freedom. As the ambulance took me through the London suburbs on a busy Friday afternoon towards Rochester it was a sort of resurrection experience – moving on from the 42 days in the hospitals. At the end of Lent comes the joyful celebration of the Lord’s Resurrection. The Liturgical Lent and my NHS Lent are outwardly not the same, but there were many similarities. Both are very real experiences within the same person. I feel that the sacred and the so called secular are intertwined and God imbues all aspects of our lives with his saving grace.

This talk is a virtual tour throughout Shorne Parish – opening its treasures and folklore for residents and visitors alike.

COBHAM LANDSCAPE DETECTIVES

Higham Village History Group held a meeting on Thursday, July 20 in Higham Memorial Hall at 8.00pm.

A warm welcome was given to all those present and notices read, which included details of a walk around the village on August 6, which will be lead by Andrew Rootes. A register of interest was set up.

The guest speaker was KCC archaeologist and project leader, Andrew Mayfield. Andrew has been involved for some time with the excavation works at Shorne Country Park, especially with the Randall Manor discoveries, this project being completed in 2015. He has now moved on with his team to finding out what lies beneath the village of Cobham and the areas around the Cobham mausoleum. He has been very fortunate to have been awarded Lottery community funding to put towards a LIDAR investigation system, a sophisticated aerial photography mapping system. This can identify old field boundaries, water courses, traces of old buildings, some dating back over 500 years and are seen from the air. This work is essential in the recording of the changes which have happened and what bearing they will have in the future. Ancient trees in Cobham Woods are also being discovered and recorded. Thirty households in Cobham village have agreed to have “test” pits in their gardens. The local school children have been helping with a trench dig on the playing fields, which has turned up lots of different finds: pottery, clay pipes, bones, etc. The test pit in the Darnley Arms car park is especially of interest to Andrew and his team; he said it is sometimes difficult to move from the inn to the car park. Residents in the village have also helped with the history project by sharing their memories with Andrew and he thanks them for this.

Andrew brought along some of the finds and copy maps, which the large audience found very interesting to look at

The next meeting is being held on September 21, when the talk will be about Norman Britain.

We were busy stitching during our July morning meeting. Most of us were working on individual pieces, finding time to admire other people's embroideries and talking over what we had planned to stitch after our August summer break. Our July speaker was Karin Buchanan who entertained us with her talk on how to customise your clothes. Karin started customising her clothes aged 12, by stitching logos and embroidery stitches on to a pair of jeans. Now, how many of us could still fit into a pair of our jeans we wore aged 12? Well, Karin still can! We saw a photo to prove it. Karin showed examples of plain T shirts transformed by cutting off the original neckline, then adding lace around the neckline. Ever had a top with a neckline that was just too low? Add some contrasting lace. Or, unusual shaped buttons were added to pick up on a part of the original design of the item. The same was done with beads, stick on sequins

and pieces of old jewellery. Skirts and dresses had necklines removed, sleeves chopped and hemlines were altered to become asymmetric on tops, dresses and skirts. Clothes became much more interesting and individual. Even boots were embellished. Here you can see Karin wearing embellished jeans, cardigan and T shirt, holding a boot that has been upcycled.
