GIVING UP FOR LENT

It is easy to forget (or to ignore) the fact that "Pancake Day" and the eating of pancakes on Shrove Tuesday came about as a way of making sure that all the eggs and fat had been eaten up before the Lenten fast. In stricter times than our own Lent meant abstinence from meat, dairy and oil. Indeed, Eastern Orthodox Christians still observe that sort of Lenten discipline and make us Western Christians look quite feeble by comparison.

Today in the West we are encouraged to decide for ourselves what our Lenten discipline should be but we should be aware of spiritual traps that we might easily fall into in making that decision. It would be a good idea to think about these possible traps before we decide what we are going to "do" for Lent.

The first danger is making our discipline all about ourselves and what we want. Going on a diet is going on a diet and has nothing at all to do with Lent. Dieting is about making us feel good about ourselves; it is something we do for ourselves and we mustn't pretend that we are doing it for God. Dieting is undoubtedly good if one is overweight, but it is not what Lent is for.

The second danger is choosing a discipline that is simply impossible or too hard to achieve. Of course, we want to please God, but we must be realistic. The danger of choosing something that is too hard is that we give up after a couple of weeks and get to Easter having achieved nothing except to gain a sense of failure and sinfulness. So when you are thinking about your Lenten discipline be certain that you will be able to sustain the discipline for the whole six weeks. Be humble in your estimation of yourself and realistic about the practical realities.

The third danger is just not bothering. Because we choose our discipline for ourselves rather than doing what everyone else is doing, it is very easy just not to bother at all and the shops are filled with chocolate temptations! But that would be a terrible missed opportunity. Our Lenten discipline is all about drawing closer to Jesus in his Passion and Death so that we might experience His Resurrection. If Lent passes us by unobserved, Easter will also be meaningless.

The fourth danger is spiritual pride. Don't show off about what you are doing!

So, having looked at four dangers, perhaps I might offer four positive tips in helping you to decide what you could do for Lent:

Remember that the aim is to draw you closer to Jesus in his selfgiving love. If you think about this before anything your decision about what you should do will be a good one.

Think of the needs of others. How can my "giving up" help others who are suffering. It is a very good thing to combine the discipline of abstinence with acts of charity. So, for example, you might decide to give up one meal on a Friday each week in Lent and give the money to a charity that cares for those who live in poverty. If you give something up for Lent, then others, not you, should benefit from what you might save financially.

Discuss your decision with your spiritual guide (perhaps one of the priests in the parish). It needn't be a long conversation, but it is helpful to check with someone else that your discipline is realistic and honest. And, of course, saying it out loud makes it much harder to escape: if we have told someone that we will refrain from chocolate for Lent then eating chocolate will be more difficult!

It maybe, of course, that you might want to take something on in Lent rather than (or as well as) giving something up. Lent is a good opportunity to breathe new life into your prayer life. How about starting that daily bible reading that you always meant to do?

And finally! Don't forget the Sacrament of Penance (Confession). It is a VERY good idea to start Lent (Shrove Tuesday) and end Lent by making a good Confession and receiving the forgiveness that God gives so freely. And Confession is always there if you find that mid-Lent your discipline has gone astray. Just ask one of the priests.

May God bless you and your Lenten Observance.

USE OF ST MARY'S CHURCH AND CHURCHYARD, HIGHAM

You will see elsewhere in this Bridge that a Sunday Evening Service in LENT is being celebrated in S.Mary's Church; and above that a burial took place in the Churchyard. In 1987 the church was declared redundant and the building was vested in the care of the Churches Conservation Trust and is no longer the responsibility of the Church of England in Higham anymore. A few public services are held each year with the Bishop's permission. It is NOT licensed for marriages and, as there is a Parish Church in the centre of the village, no baptisms or funerals take place there either. The Churchyard HOWEVER remains open and in the care of the Parish Church Council so burials of bodies and ashes at S.Mary's can still take place with Christian prayer. There are limitations as to who may be buried/interred there in order to preserves space for the village's Christian residents.





But this is more than a feel-good movie for dog-lovers, as it illustrates important lessons for our own journey through life.

HIARA JANUARY REPORT

"Fraud Awareness" was the subject at the January meeting of HiARA. Nationwide Building Society's "Take Five" project was given by Kim Randall and 3 members of the Gravesend branch. Aided by several short films giving instructions of how people are parted from their savings, which resulted in £48 million pounds being stolen by scams in the first 6 months of 2017. The team proceeded to show how very many ways crooks can dupe people. These included: Charity scams in streets (bogus). Telephone frauds: very easy if you are not aware and give your bank number. Credit card deception; never give your PIN number out. Refund scams: on items bought online. Health scams: prepaid treatment! Investment offers where many of the various ways rogues can part you from your cash.

The team emphasised that every branch has a fraud department to try to help you and stop these various scams and frauds. Branches of banks never ring and ask you for your information – they have already got it. If anyone rings and purports to be from a bank, put the telephone down and ring your bank back after 5 minutes to check. Your credit cards are protected, so keep them safe and be careful in shops and public place where there are crowds.

There is so much confusion about what we can and cannot recycle but the website for Gravesham provides the following handy guide with regard to plastics. Plastic Bottles

What can be recycled	What can't be recycled
Cleaning product bottles (e.g. bathroom cleaners, bleach)*	Anything that looks like a pot, tub, tray or tube
Detergent and soap bottles (please remove the pumps from the bottles, as these are not recyclable)	Black plastic bottles (sorting equipment cannot detect the colour black and therefore it is not recycled)
Fizzy/non-fizzy drinks and water bottles	Plastic bottles containing chemicals (strong chemicals that are highly poisonous are hazardous to staff and can damage the recycling equipment)
Milk bottles	
Ready-to-use plant food and pesticide bottles (check the label)	
Shampoo/shower gel bottles	
Skin care product bottles	

^{*} Triggers can also be left on to be recycled

Please remember:

- Empty and rinse items before recycling left over food or liquids can contaminate other recyclables.
- Leave on labels these will be removed in the recycling process.

NORTH KENT EMBROIDERERS' GUILD

When you think of postcards, do you like me think of holidays and sunshine, wish you were here messages and memories? Or are they a thing of the past, so that instead of sending a physical postcard, we send messages and pictures via our phones, tablets and social media? Have we lost a part of our history, or is it just progress? Or perhaps some of us still send a postcard because traditionally we have always done it.



Cards with messages had been sporadically created by and posted individuals since the beginning of the postal The earliest known picture service. postcard was a hand-painted design on card, posted in Fulham in London by the writer Mr Theodore Hook in 1840, bearing a Penny Black stamp. He probably created and posted the card (which he sent to

himself) as a practical joke, since the image is a caricature of workers in the post office. Who can say? but in 2002 the postcard sold for a record £31.750.

During the first world war, solders sent embroidered postcards back home to loved ones and family. They were made by women in Belgian villages, who saw an opportunity to make some money. These postcards are sought after and collected today, not just for the beautifully skilled embroidered front, but the heartfelt messages on the back and I often wonder when I see them, if the soldier made it home.





We at the North Kent Embroiderers' Guild decided that as a project each month, we would make a postcard with a theme, collect them into a bag and each person takes out a card that someone else has made. Although we all had the same instructions, what came back was as diverse and imaginative as the person who created it. Our first project

was Trees, our second counted threads, our third Christmas and the last one so far is Seascape. With three more months to go, it has been an exciting project.
