Flight Check In?

Over the last few years my wife and I have grabbed some 'borrowed sunshine' in spring in places like Malta, Spain, Croatia. These were wonderful visits but the travel arrangements sometimes tested patience and stamina.

Summer approaches, As many people are about to 'fly off' to all sorts of places. We hope they won't have any 'computer glitches' with all its attendant delays. Flying is complicated by all the security now very visibly in place even after booking a flight and pay its cost. Check-in times are fixed or if you're too late vou'll be barred from boarding. Passport control (if you've actually received it in time) takes you finally to the departure area where you can shop, eat or just wait. You'll need the correct currency or ensure your credit cards will be accepted where you're going. At the boarding gate a final valid ticket and passport are needed and checked. Once on the plane, after takeoff, the holiday is on its way. Landing, and after passport control, collecting your luggage it's on to your accommodation. All being well, journey over, the holiday has begun. The only sour note is knowing you have to return to your real life.

Holiday Flights can be salutary reminders to consider the FINAL flight we all must make. Will we ever get there despite all the arrangements our God and Father has put in place, made and offers? The Lord Jesus Christ warns us (S.John Ch.3) that unless we are 'born again of water and the Spirit' we shall not see the Kingdom of God. Baptism is like 'booking the flight'. The 'cost' of it is discipleship and its promise to live the Christian life.

Booking any flight is confirmed by check-in. Check-in, we know has to be done before it is too late. Baptism too need *Confirmation* if we are to enter, as it were, 'the waiting lounge' of life within the Church: lots to see, do, be fed and watered, or obtain necessities for the journey. Finally, beyond the boarding gate, and because we have the 'right paperwork', we begin a *one-way flight* to a place from which we shall never return: from this ordinary reality to that extraordinary reality which if God, *inexpressibly described* even in the vivid picture language of Holy Scriptures.

The Born-Again (BA?) flight, that spiritual flight, only begins with baptism. Yet without the rest of it check-in, sufficient resources and nourishment (i.e. Confirmation, worship, study and Holy Communion) we might actually be going nowhere. Just watch the TV show 'Airport'. Despite all the arguments people bring forward, whatever they say, however much they argue (or abuse the staff) – they're **never** allowed on board if the necessary conditions aren't met. *You can't make up your own rules to fly*. There are no 'stowaways' nor self-made rules on the spiritual flight either!

Allegories are not perfect but as the travel season arrives we can ask ourselves if only the booking (baptism) has been made? Have all the other requirements for *the flight* been fulfilled? If not, will we even make it into the waiting area because you have yet to *check-in*. No one can do this for us but too late may indeed be too late. The *spiritual* departure gate closed, the transport gone, we may be left behind.

St. Benedict

Feast day 11th July.

Born in of Norcia, Italy, around 480, Benedict was the son of a Roman noble and twin of his sister, St. Scholastica.

Sent to Rome to finish his education his subject for study was rhetoric -- the art of persuasive speaking. A successful speaker was not one who had the best argument or conveyed the truth, but one who used rhythm, eloquence, and technique to convince. The power of the voice without foundation in the heart was the goal of the student's education. And that philosophy was reflected in the lives of the students as well. They had everything -- education, wealth, youth --

and they spent all of it in the pursuit of hedonistic pleasure, not truth. Benedict watched in horror as vice unravelled the lives and ethics of his companions. Afraid for his soul, Benedict fled Rome, gave up his inheritance and lived in a small village.

When God called him beyond this quiet life to an even deeper solitude, he went to the mountains of Subiaco. Although becoming a hermit was not his purpose in leaving, there he lived as a hermit under the direction of another hermit, Romanus. Living in a cave above a lake as a hermit, after years of prayer word of his holiness brought nearby monks to ask for his leadership. He warned them he would be too strict, but they insisted - then tried to poison him when his warning proved true. It is said when he prayed a blessing over a poisoned cup it shattered. The next set of followers were more sincere and he set up twelve monasteries in Subiaco where monks lived in small separate communities of twelve (reflecting Jesus and his twelves apostles). He left these monasteries abruptly the attacks of another envious hermit made it impossible to continue their spiritual leadership.

At Monte Cassino he founded the monastery that became the roots of the Church's subsequent monastic system. Instead of small separate communities he gathered his disciples into one whole community. His twin sister, Saint Scholastica, settled nearby to live a religious life amongst women. After 1,500 years of monastic tradition this direction seems obvious to us yet Benedict was an innovator. No one had ever set up communities like his before or directed them with a rule. What is history to us now was a bold, risky step into the future. Benedict had the holiness and the skill to take this forward. His beliefs and instructions on religious life were collected in what is now known as the Rule of Saint Benedict -- still directing most religious community life after 15 centuries.

In this tiny but powerful Rule, Benedict put his rhetorical skills at the service of the Gospel. Scholars suggest that his Rule reflects an understanding of and skill with the rules of rhetoric. Benedict did not shun rhetoric because it had been used to seduce people to sin; he reformed it its use for good. Benedict did not want to lose the power of voice to reach up to God simply because others had use it to sink down to the gutter. There was always a voice reading aloud in his communities at meals, to receive guests, to educate novices. Hearing words one time was not enough- it states - "We wish this Rule to be read frequently to the community."

Benedict realized the strongest and truest foundation for the power of words was the Word of God itself: "For what page or word of the Bible is not a perfect rule for temporal life?" He had experienced the power of God's word as expressed in Scripture: "For just as from the heavens the rain and snow come down and do not return there till they have watered the earth, making it fertile and fruitful, giving seed to him who sows and bread to him who eats, so shall my word be that goes forth from my mouth; It shall not return to me void, but shall do my will, achieving the end for which I sent it" (Isaiah 55:10-11).

For prayer, Benedict turned to the psalms, the very songs and poems from the Jewish liturgy that Jesus himself had prayed. To join our voices with Jesus in praise of God during the day was so important that Benedict called it the "Work of God." And nothing was to be put before the work of God. "Immediately upon hearing the signal for the Divine Office all work will cease." Benedict believed with Jesus that "One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of God!" (Matthew 4:4).

But it wasn't enough to just speak the words. Benedict instructed his followers to practice sacred reading, to study the very Scriptures they would be praying in the Work of God. In this 'Lectio Divina', he and his monks memorized Scripture, studied it, and contemplated it until it became part of their being. Four to six hours were set aside each day for this sacred reading. If monks had free time it "should be used by the brothers to practice psalms." Lessons from Scripture were to be spoken from memory not read from a book. On Benedict's list of "Instruments of Good Works" is "to enjoy holy readings."

A story from Benedict's life is of a poor man begging for a little oil. Although Benedict commanded that the oil be given, the cellarer refused - because there was very little left and there would be none for the monastery. Angry at this distrust in God's providence, Benedict knelt down to pray and a bubbling sound came from inside the oil jar. The monks watched, fascinated, as God filled the vessel so completely with oil it overflowed and pushed the cover off, cascading out on to the floor. In Benedictine prayer, our hearts are regarded as the vessel empty of thoughts and intellectual striving. All that remains is the trust in God's providence to fill us. Emptying ourselves thus brings God's abundant goodness bubbling up in our hearts, first with an inspiration or two, and finally overflowing our heart with contemplative love.

Benedict died on 21 March 543, shortly after his sister, St Scholastica (feast day February 10th). It is said he died with high fever on the very day God told him he would.

The spread of Benedictine monasteries played an immense role in the development or preservation of Christian faith and culture throughout Europe (eg Higham Priory, Hoo Priory, Strood Hospital, and the re-founded cathedrals of Canterbury and Rochester and numerous others JUST in Kent).

Due to such widespread influence one can see why St Benedict is one six copatrons of Europe along with five others: Two other men, Ss Cyril and Methodius, and three women Ss. Bridget of Sweden, Theresa Benedicta of the Cross and Catherine of Siena. He is also, and one can understand why from his life and rule, patron of all students. 

Why it is good to talk to yourself

When we see people talking out loud to themselves, we can tend to avoid them as slightly odd. But, in reality, they may be very smart indeed. According to a recent study at Bangor University, those of us who speak to ourselves while focusing on a task do better than those of us who stay silent.

It seems that when we read instructions out loud, our brains absorb information more quickly. As one psychologist at Bangor explained: 'Our ability to generate explicit self-instructions is actually one of the best tools we have for cognitive control.'

Things simply work better when said aloud. Talking to ourselves helps us to better organise our thoughts, plan our actions, consolidate our memories, and control our emotions.
